NORLEY is a township in Frodsham parish, Runcorn union, containing, by the census of 1861, 728 inhabitants, and 1367 acres; in the hundred of Eddisbury, South Cheshire; 5 miles south-east from Frodsham, and 3 north-west from Acton station. The living is a perpetual curacy, valued at £114 per annum, in the incumbency of the Rev. William Lees, M.A., and the patronage of Samuel Woodhouse, Esq. The Church, dedicated to Saint John the Evangelist, is a neat Gothic edifice, with tower, surmounted by pinnacles, containing one bell and a clock. The Association and Wesleyan Methodists have each places of worship here, and a day and Sunday school in connexion with the latter. There is also a good National School for the children of both sexes.

Letters by foot-post from Frodsham.

LYMM, formerly written LIMME, is a parish in Altrincham union, containing, by the census of 1861, 3769 inhabitants, and 4284 acres; in the hundred of Bucklow, east division of Frodsham deanery, archdeaconry and diocese of Chester, North Cheshire, 6 miles west from Altrincham, 5 south-east from Warrington, 7 north-west from Knutsford, and 13½ from Manchester, on the Warrington and Stockport Railway, at which it has a station. The Bridgewater Canal also runs through the parish. The living is a rectory, which was divided into two medietyes previously to the Norman Conquest; the first mediety, valued at £336 per annum, with residence, is in the incumbency of the Rev. Thomas Redhead Branfoot, M.A., and the patronage of Egerton Leigh, Esq. The second mediety, with Warburton attached, is valued at £250 per annum, with residence, and is in the incumbency of the Rev. Daniel Augustus Beaufort, M.A., and the patronage of Rowland Eyles Egerton Warburton, Esq. The Church, dedicated to the Virgin Mary, is a handsome edifice, in the early decorated style, and was built in 1850-1, on the site of the ancient one; it consists of nave, side aisles, chancel, transept, and tower. The Grammar School was

endowed in 1608, by Sir George Warburton and William Domville, and was re-opened in August last, in the building formerly used as the National School. New Parochial Schools have been erected in Pepper Street, with funds left for that purpose by the late Thomas Jackson, Esq. The Independents, Primitive and Wesleyan Methodists, and Roman Catholics have each places of worship here. Egerton Leigh and Rowland Eyles Egerton Warburton are lords of the manor.

WARBURTON is a parish in Altrincham union, containing, by the census of 1861, 484 inhabitants, and 1747 acres; in the hundred of Bucklow, east division of Frodsham deanery, archdeaconry and diocese of Chester, North Cheshire; $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Lymm, 5 from Altrincham, $7\frac{1}{2}$ from Warrington, 9 from Knutsford, and 12 from Manchester; on the south bank of the Mersey, which divides Cheshire and Lancashire. The Church, dedicated to Saint Werburgh, is an ancient timber building, erected about the 14th century, and was repaired with stone in the 17th century; it consists of nave, transept, chancel, and aisles, which are separated from the nave by wooden pillars; it has a brick tower, covered with ivy, and contains one bell. The living is a rectory, held with the second mediety of Lymm, in the incumbency of the Rev. Daniel Augustus Beaufort, M.A., and the patronage of R. E. E. Warburton, Esq.; annual value, £250. There is a good school for children of both sexes. Rowland E. Egerton Warburton, Esq., is lord of the manor.
